ECO POLICY

St Annes Bagshot



1. Our Christian Calling

As a Church within the Church of England, we accept that caring for God's creation is a fundamental expression of our Christian faith.

We acknowledge the urgent challenge of the climate crisis and accept our part in responding both as individuals and as a church family.

2. Theological and Liturgical Foundations

We are inspired by:

- The Biblical witness of creation's goodness (Genesis 1), and human stewardship (Genesis 2:15)
- The Church of England's commitment to net zero carbon by 2030.
- The Season of Creation / Creationtide (1st September to 4th October) as a time for teaching, prayer, and action.

3. Our Environmental Vision

We seek to become a church that:

- Respects creation as God's gift;
- Reduces its ecological footprint;
- Responds in an active way to the climate emergency;
- Restores the relationship between people and planet.

4. Practical Commitments

Worship and Teaching

- Incorporate creation themes into services regularly with a monthly ECO church service and especially during Creationtide, Harvest festival and other times such as Earth day
- Include prayers for the environment in intercessions.
- Teach environmental stewardship in sermons, youth groups, and home groups.

Energy Use and Carbon Reduction

- Audit our energy use and work toward reducing emissions by reducing our heating and considering "heating the person not the room"
- Transition to renewable energy suppliers where possible.
- Improve heating efficiency in line with the Church of England's Net Zero Carbon Toolkit. Maximise energy
 efficient lightbulbs, improve insulation where possible and work towards solar energy as a clean sustainable
 option.

Land and Buildings

- Maintain the churchyard as a haven for biodiversity with native planting and no harmful chemicals.
- Encourage community gardening via our allotment which is used by members of the community such as scouts and cubs or the Miriam Grace Day club.
- Promote wildlife spaces by rewilding an area of the church garden
- Encouraging the Bagshot Bee group who have an apiary on adjacent land

Installing rainwater collection and water-efficient fixtures.

Waste and Consumption

- Avoid single-use plastics at all church events.
- Recycle responsibly and reduce unnecessary consumption. Continue to expand the recycling offer to include plastics, printer cartridges, water filters, bottle tops, batteries and Bras.
- Use environmentally friendly cleaning and office products.

Sustainable Catering

- Prioritise Fairtrade, local, and plant-based food.
- Ensure a vegetarian and vegan option for catered events
- Minimise food waste and promote responsible catering practices.

Travel and Transport

- Encourage walking, cycling, car-sharing and public transport.
- Promote the installation of bicycle racks.
- Assess travel impact of church activities and meetings.

Community Engagement and Advocacy

- Join the Eco Church scheme and work toward Bronze, Silver or Gold award levels.
- Partner with local environmental groups and other ECO groups
- Raise awareness of global climate justice and support initiatives such as Tearfund, Christian Aid, and A Rocha
 UK.

5. Oversight and Accountability

We will establish an ECO lead and team to:

- Monitor progress and review the ECO policy annually.
- Report regularly to the PCC (Parochial Church Council).
- Encourage wider congregational participation.

6. Review and Renewal

This policy will be reviewed annually at the PCC and updated to reflect theological insights, scientific developments, and local needs.

7. A Prayer for Creation

Dear lord, you made the goodness of the land, the riches of the sea, and the rhythm of the seasons; as we thank you for these gifts may we cherish and respect this planet, and use its resources wisely and faithfully, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
